



Thank you for all the help, kind words, helpful donations and your timely efforts that made the year a memorable one for us and the animals we could reach out to.



April 2007

Dog bites in the city increased due to soaring temperatures and killing of local dogs. Packs of feral dogs caused hysteria both in the media and among public. Blue Cross was called on by the Human Rights Commissioner to give a representation on the Animal Birth Control efforts to curb dog menace. We were able to prove with ground evidence that the sterilization and vaccination of docile street / community dogs is the only way to prevent Rabies and dog bites.



May 2007

The State Animal Welfare Board met to discuss cruel transportation of cattle. The State Road Transport Authorities promised to intervene in the issue. A ban was placed on all auction sale of cattle from Temples. The District Animal Welfare Committee met at the Collector's Office to enforce animal protection Laws. Ahimsa Day was celebrated at Heera Roopani's residence with a video presentation on the compassionate work of Dada Vaswani. Prayers were said for various world problems. We held our Annual Shelter Adoptathon-part of a world wide shelter effort to find homes for shelter animals.

#### June 2007

On world environment day, saplings were planted in the cattle areas of our shelter.




Chaitanya and Cloud win Big Heart award

Awareness regarding the sterilization and vaccination of community dogs at Vanasthalipuram was conducted, introducing Mrs. Y Padmaja responsible for our "Relay Rescue." Relay rescue is special effort to keep injured animals safe and give first aid to they reach a veterinary hospital.

Zoonosis Day was celebrated on July 6th. An awareness display was shown in the courtyard on Zoonosis diseases, why we need to boil milk or pasteurize it, waterborne diseases, etc.





The Annual Report was printed and circulated to members. We are grateful to Pragati Art Printers and Mr. Narendra for his continuous support to publish our annual report free of cost.

The Commissioner RTA Mr. C.L.N. Gandhi, passed new rules for the prevention of cruelty to animals during transportation. Under these rules strict norms for transporting cattle by road were outlined. Kudos to Mr. Gandhi!

Blue Cross made trendy comfortable T-Shirts for sale and visibility. Independence Day was celebrated with flag-hoisting and lunch for all the staff. The Bhatt family from Commando Kennels were chief guests for the occasion.

August 2007

Blue Cross was visited by Mr. Mahendra Singh Kacchava, wildlife lawyer and animal activist responsible for booking cases against prominent and notorious wildlife poachers. including Salman Khan. He addressed a group of wildlife protectors both from Govt and AWO's sharing his experiences and giving precautions to take when gathering evidence for cases against wildlife poaching.

Blue Cross AGM was conducted on Aug 19th. After the meeting the Committee and volunteers put up an entertaining skit enacting a day at Blue Cross Animal Shelter!! Members went home in splits as some of the events were looked at in good humour.

#### September 2007


Our Founder visited Tirupathi to address Veterinary College students and participated in a March to promote the sterilization and vaccination of dogs. Organised by Animal Care Land, Tirupathi, the event was given good publicity by the Media.

The New Animal Welfare Board of India was constituted and our honorary Secretary, Amala Akkineni was nominated as member.

#### October 2007

World Animal Day was celebrated by sponsoring prizes for the COVA Idea Fair for Schools in the old city. Over 1800 children from 27 school participated in the event from age groups 10 to 16 yrs acknowledging their contributions in the fields of Science, Mathematics, Literature and Environment. The Environment prize went to the exhibit from Sharada Girls High School.





4th October, World Animal Day was celebrated with a free clinic and homeless animal feeding by Blue Cross. A ARV Camp was conducted at Asif Nagar, Mehdipatnam to support the community and bring awareness. Our Community Facilitator and Amala interacted with Shri. Devera Kuranakar, Ex. Corporator and the community. Information pamphlets were distributed and efforts to resolve problems regarding human animal conflict were made. Apart from this a few animals were given treatment by our Veterinarians. Totally 89 dogs were vaccinated against Rabies and 3 Rabbits and 5 dogs were treated for skin problems. Our Jumble Sale raised Rs 10,000 plus this year. Prayers and a Free Clinic for Pets was organised at BCH. The Shelter Director turned 70 and hosted a Lunch for Staff.

#### November 2007

Amala Akkineni attended the I-CONGO Conclave on Climate Change at Delhi. The new Director for Brooke Hospital for Animals - India, Admiral Malhotra visited Blue Cross.

During the Diwali period, no adoptions were given due to trauma of noise pollution and safety risks. There was an awareness drive regarding the same.

#### December 2007

Blue Cross conducted an awareness session at the Municipal Dog Pound going through routines for catching, housing, handling and segregating mothers and litters of pups during the ABC/AR efforts.

Farmers Day was celebrated with a Camp at Kurnool for treatment of cattle. The Mobile Clinic Team treated 80 animals for wounds, deworming, ARV and respiratory problems.

January 2008


The National Animal Welfare Fortnight was celebrated with great vigour and enthusiasm. The thrust this year was "Towards a Rabies Free Hyderabad." (See details on pg.18) Blue Cross of Hyderabad celebrated it's anniversary completing 16 years of service to animals by feeding as many homeless animals as possible on the roads.

Independence Day was celebrated with the Staff at our Shelter. The Big Heart Award went to Chaitanya and his dog Cloud. Chaitanya, a former dog-walking Volunteer, adopted a thin, depressed, abandoned German Shepherd and transformed it into a "Champion". Best Employee of the Year went to R. Suresh. Others appreciated were Sri Dhananjeya for his Construction work, Dr. Kirmani for his special commitment to the BCH and Aparna Rao for her creating the new area for abandoned dog; Ms. Saraswati as promising newcomer.

# Animal Ambulance and Rescue Service

This year we have been able to rescue 6652 sick, injured and abused animals. Hyderabad just got bigger with the creation of GHMC (Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation) and this poses a great challenge for us if we must reach animals that need our help in time. We encourage our members, supporters and even those who pass an injured or abused who co-operate. Call us if the animal is around the areas covered by the Blue Cross, animal to co-operate. Call us in an auto, the cost of transporting the animal will be reimbursed! But please don't leave an animal to die on the road!





# The Animal Shelter at Rd.35 Jubilee Hills


Our 2 Acre shelter is a haven for sick, injured, abused, old, destitute, abandoned and completely helpless animals who find shelter here. Holding over 600 animals that require care and protection, this is neither a boarding kennel nor a puppy farm. Only the homeless, old, injured or abused animals are housed here.

#### Cattle Protection & Gowshala


Cattle are the most used and abused creatures in India today. After a lifetime's service producing milk for human consumption they are promptly sold off for slaughter when unable to produce anymore. Male calves as they are unfit for dairy production, are also sold at birth for slaughter. Under such sad and pathetic conditions, left to roam the streets scrounging for food at dustbins eating plastic bags; many are hit by traffic. The lucky ones are reported and rescued by Blue Cross to be given Veterinary care and shelter.

We have gone through much effort to set up a Gobar Gas plant, Vermicompost production, Panchgavya fertilizer production etc, to promote organic ways and the value of the cow. Please do visit our Gowshala, feed the cows and purchase our organic products for your garden.

Presently 56 cattle and 4 Equines are housed at Blue Cross.



# REPORT FROM THE SHELTER DIRECTORS




Let's talk about how the trees grew beautifully and leave aside the perennial problem of running an animal shelter from any angle, especially that of staff shortage or visitors who see negatively but inactively. We have a fine new Quarantine Ward and Mortuary to curb the spread of infection. The Mortuary was donated by Mr. CPW Gibbs of Ireland. It has made a big difference to shelter health and hygiene. Aparna, our Treasurer, designed and built a new Re-Homing Ward for abandoned pets that suffered in cages. The ward is an attractive venue for those adopting adult dogs.


We cannot stress enough the need for the animal owners to understand that we do not condone abandoning a Pet for any reason=whether old-age, blindness, chronic illness, extended vacations, whim or whatever. It is cruel. A Pet is for life, life, life! Road accidents (those reported to us) have reached the 50 animal monthly average. At least 10 Breed dogs are abandoned in the streets every month (those we are informed about)-even blind old Labradors who cannot manage in the heat without food and water.

Dr. Preity joined us from Assam as Vet this year and trained in ABC at Chennai under Blue Cross of India. We lost Dr. Peter Nolosco to higher Study but welcomed Dr. Ajay Kumar, Surgeon, after a difficult gap. He is heading the ABC Programme and Surgical cases. Dr. Kirmani continues to be our lifeline as well as our Skin Specialist. And Dr. Yadav trained for the treatment of camels with Help in Suffering Jaipur. He continues to head the mobile clinic for working animals.

The kindest thing one can do is to befriend our canine brothers and sisters. We are living in closer and closer proximity... Let them into your hearts and homes. As our shelter fills with more disabled dogs, victims of road accidents, we need more sponsors and Big Hearts to home them. Your status will not sink if you have a 3 legged dog- you might even start a trend.


#### HOMELESS ANIMAL ADOPTION



This year Blue Cross was able to have 454 puppies, cats, full grown dogs, cattle, adopted into good and caring homes.

Special effort was made to promote the Indian dog and cat with reference to their nature which is loving and devoted. Hardy and perfectly suited to our climate with a short manageable coat they are highly resistant to disease. Even tempered, good watch dogs or mouse catchers, they are very easy to look after. Compared to them GSDs and Pommeranians are completely unsuitable for our climate.

#### Veterinary Hospital

Blue Cross of Hyderabad runs a clean and affordable veterinary hospital for pet animals during morning hours to encourage the adoption of animals from our shelter and off the streets. This year 2059 pet and domesticated animals visited our Clinic with their owners and received treatment.

#### Homeopathy at the Blue Cross

Dr. V. Praveen Kumar and Dr. V. Pradeepa, Homeopathic Specialists (Human and Animal specialists), from Sri Saradhamba Homeopathic Specialty Centre, have been giving their services free to the animals at BCH for the last year. In many cases, where older or very young animals do not respond to Allopathic treatment, they have been able to provide effective Homeo treatment in a number of cases and are always on hand to advise us. We are very grateful for their interest, time, expertise and kindness.

## Veterinary Drugs & Medicines:

Our Pharmacy drug distribution for animal welfare was stocked and monitored by Mr. Satish who located good quality drugs at best prices. We are very grateful for his participation and support.




Garbage = Stray Animals

By sterilising one pair of stray dogs we ensure 2000 less in the future! This year we sterilized 3,648 stray (community) dogs and vaccinated 436 against Rabies. Revaccination against Rabies was taken up in areas that were covered by the ABC / AR last year. We are happy to note that there were no incidents or reports of Rabies in these areas.








# Humane Education and Awareness Programme



Veterinary medicines available for animal welfare

#### PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS



If you spend a day at our Shelter and listen to calls coming in, reports from city residents and see cases of animals rescued, you will understand how cruelty and apathy to animals is on the rise. It would seem all too depressing to continue our work if we did not believe that animal people must be strong, vociferous and show the way towards harmony between species. Please join us as a voice against cruelty to animals. Orientations are held regularly so do sign up!

#### The main atrocities seen were:

117 Pet dogs in pathetic conditions abandoned to fend for themselves on the street by their owners; getting attacked by street dogs or becoming emaciated and contacting skin disease. These included GSDs, Labradors, Doberman, Pomeranians and other cross breed dogs.

290 Animals were hit and run by rushing traffic that did not stop to consider the hurt animal lying in a pool of blood. The animals included bullocks, buffalo, cows and calves, dogs, including a mother and her pups and cats.

Then there are the badly neglected animals brought to our Clinic: 92 cases of neglect including dogs, cats, rabbits, buffalo, cows and others. The owners were counselled and in some cases given warnings regarding their responsibilities. In some extreme cases we confiscated the animals.

#### The severe atrocities against animals we dealt with were:

Cases of Poisoning: 2 Dogs. Gun shot wounds: 2 dogs

Wire tied around neck: 1 Rhesus monkey- died due to injuries.

Acid burns: 1 dog. Fire cracker burns: 2 Rhesus monkeys

Strangulation and killing with brake wire by Society watchman: 1 dog


Badly beaten or stoned with dislocations or injuries: I Langur, 3 Rhesus Monkeys, 2 dogs, 1 mynah

Brought in with complaints of aggression: 1 buffalo (who turned completely docile at the shelter)

Merciless felling of old trees on the highway destroyed birds nests and left 60 young cattle egrets to fend for themselves and killed hundreds of other young ones.



# MOBILE EQUINE WELFARE UNIT IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE BROOKE HOSPITAL FOR ANIMALS – INDIA




The Mobile Equine Care programme conducted by The Brooke Hospital for Animals (U.K.) and Blue Cross of Hyderabad started in February 2001. It developed into a partnership with the Brooke Hospital for Animals – India in 2005. The past 7 years have seen efforts that have step by step led the economically very poor communities involved to a better and more prosperous existence for both humans and their equines.

Report for the year 2007-2008


Equine Welfare in Hyderabad City: This project is a partnership that has been working for the past 7 years with very good results and has a wide reach. Our efforts focused this year on sustainable Equine Welfare focusing on Kurnool district after seeing reasonable success in Hyderabad city. The working equines of the city seemed to be doing much better after 5 years of sustained awareness and support from our team. In the past we have provided Veterinary care, shade shelters and water troughs, farrier training and awareness to owners. Now, besides providing a weekly visit and emergency support the team found time to concentrate on other locations with working equine populations. The reassuring change has been that these city owners value our visits and are even willing to pay for the medicines provided for their equines. The city halts are at Ghas Mandi (Grass Market), Old City Chudibazar, Begum Bazar. Slightly further halts are at Aleru and Choutuppal. And further still is Yadagirigutta, which is a temple town visited once every month. The owners have unions and MOU's with Blue Cross in place.

#### Equines working at Brick Kilns

There are 14 brick kilns surrounding the city. This year the focus of brick kiln efforts was motivation and regularization. Donkeys and ponies continue to work to transport bricks from the kiln to the loading areas. The work starts before dawn and continues non stop till midday. Pack sores and wounds from the rubbing of the brick load were a common sight. Weekly visits for Veterinary care and by spending time to educate and encourage the animal handlers, the wounds, cruelties and disease have been drastically reduced. As a



result the condition of these animals is good despite the grueling work and heat. However, as the owners and labour involved are migrants and shift frequently, the efforts are on going and do not look like they can be a community sustained effort. 14 Such brick kilns are at Ravirala, Kongara, Solakpalli, Relaguda, Yelamguda, Madaram and Kodkanchi. All kiln owners constructed their own shade shelters for the animals and provided water troughs. They also provided a caretaker to feed the animals during off season, and assured trained adult handlers for their animals as previously the animals were left in the hands of children during monsoon season.

# Equines at Kurnool District

The maximum population of working equines is in Kurnool district. The population is so widely spread out and in such rural locations the team makes an intensive effort for seven days every month to reach Veterinary assistance and support to the community through animal welfare. The 22 areas covered on route through four districts are:



The main problems faced by the animals working in these villages are Colic, branding and firing by quacks, overloading and sores due to this, dehydration due to poor management, poor shoeing and Tetanus. The owners do not have the practice of vaccinating the animals

and are accustomed to use quacks to chase the evil (disease) away. Over the past year our efforts have been to visit these remote areas, interact with the owners who are suspicious of NGO's; convince them to vaccinate their animals and follow better animal management to reduce the suffering.

Our team works round the clock on their visits, spending time to encourage and educate all stake holders in animal management including the family members, the cart maker, Farrier, shoe maker, quacks and others. They conduct the monthly camps at Government Veterinary Hospital with the intention of creating a link between the animal owner and the Veterinary Doctors of the region. Through this effort Dr. Yadav has ensured follow up treatment for the animals and has oriented Government Vets in Equine care.

#### Training Programmes:

Dr. Yadav conducted training workshops for Veterinarians at the Govt. head quarters in Bhongir in June 2007. A similar one was conducted at Sagroli in September 2007 and at Alagada (Kurnool) in February 2008. A training for Para Veterinary Staff was conducted at Sagroli (Maharashtra) in September 2007.

#### Intensive Equine Care Camps in other areas:


The Mobile Equine Care Unit along with The Brooke Hospital for Animals India visit certain places with high equine population to conduct Intensive Camps twice every year. The areas were extended this year to include Sagroli, Nanded, Atkali, Kundalawadi and Naigaon. Local NGO's like Dharma Donkey Sanctuary, Sagroli and SPCA Nanded are two dedicated organizations that have worked with us repeatedly to organize and conduct the camps. Similar animal related problems as seen in Kurnool are also seen here.

The total number of cases treated by our team and animals helped this year were 10194 equines (horses, donkeys and mules).

#### CITY WILDLIFE




City wildlife have faced much destruction and disturbance with our city growing more and more animal – un-friendly! Even at the KBR Park, a National Park under Government protection, the laughers club, joggers and walkers continue to invade the peace and tranquility of their space day after day, in the name of loving wildlife!

On World Habitat day Blue Cross volunteers along with the WWF and PFA stood outside KBR park and spoke to these people about their choice to protect Wildlife habitat by walking outside the park instead of inside. Most people objected violently. Only the youngsters immediately understood and chose to walk outside. The PCCF Wildlife also chose to walk inside the park that day, officially perhaps!

This year we rescued 264 birds and small wildlife. Of these 140 Survived and were rehabilitated successfully. We are grateful to Bharatiya Prani Mitra Sangh, Friends of Snakes Society and People for Animals for their support.





#### MARINE CONSERVATION - THE OLIVE RIDLEY TURTLE

Orissa is the last nesting ground of the Olive Ridley Turtle. We continued our protection efforts along the Devi river mouth where turtles nest on an island protected by sea. 300 local stray dogs, fast growing in numbers due to human habitation, and largely responsible for the destruction of nests, were sterilized. Fishermen were involved in awareness meetings and discussions and a sea change has been noted among the local villages in their attitude to the turtles.

# NATIONAL ANIMAL WELFARE FORTNIGHT (JAN 15TH TO 31ST 2008)



Between the 15th and 31st of January, the country celebrated the National Animal Welfare Fortnight. Here at the Blue Cross of Hyderabad we use the opportunity to highlight activities within the community to support animals. Simple things like vaccination against Rabies can ensure Rabies free zones and make the city safer for both people and animals. Killing the local dogs however actually increases the chance of Rabies as new dogs enter carrying the disease. We conducted vaccination and re-vaccination camps across the city, as part of our Rabies free Hyderabad and Animal Birth Control programme. At the camps we also treated of injured and abused animals and spread awareness about Animal Welfare.


735 canines (all community stray dogs) were re-vaccinated and released through our camps at different parts of the city covering Jubilee Hills, Banjara Hills, Ameerpet, Yusufguda, Borabanda and the surrounding areas upto Abids, Gun Rock and Mahendra Hills. A camp for de-worming and treatment of local goats in Madhapur for respiratory problems was also conducted.


On the 23rd of January, the 16th Anniversary of Blue Cross, we fed 150 homeless animals on the streets around Jubilee Hills, Vivekanandanagar and Masthanagar. This is customary and all members are invited to join us in this feeding every year- a way to express our friendship and gratitude to the animals.

Our Mobile Equine Care Unit reached out to 3644 Ponies, Donkeys and Horses with health check-ups and efforts guiding owners to take better care.

The fortnight concluded with a counseling session at the Blue Cross of Hyderabad that dealt with all animal related issues, conflict and difficulties within homes and communities. People were invited to discuss their concerns and share our understanding to resolve conflict with animals.


Over 1100 dogs, 267 poultry, 3586 donkeys, 58 horses and over 100 cattle being helped!
